

My thanks to our previous council, new council, administration, staff, and community for a job well done and for the heart shown in 2021.






#### MESSAGE FROM CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

#### OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

The Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) for the municipality ensures that the policies and programs of the municipality are implemented. The CAO advises and informs Council on the municipality's operations while performing and exercising the duties, functions, and powers assigned through the *Municipal Government Act* and Council.

Legislative Services includes activities related to the custody and maintenance of bylaws, policies, corporate records, Council agendas and minutes, elections, and the administration of the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FOIP).

The Chief Administrative Officer also oversees Protective Services, Fire Department and Emergency Management, and Corporate Communications.



#### **FINANCE SERVICES**

The Finance department is responsible for budgeting, property tax, accounts receivable, accounts payable, and utilities. Taxes help ensure the Town of Westlock citizens have excellent services that contribute to a quality lifestyle to deliver the many day-to-day services and programs that citizens need, want, and deserve.



#### **OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT**

The Operations department performs a wide variety of daily tasks, maintenance, and repairs related to infrastructure such as streets, laneways, sidewalks, curbs, storm mains, and gutters. This department also monitors, maintains, and repairs water and sanitary systems throughout the Town. Additionally, under contract, Operations maintains the regional water treatment plant, pumping stations, and distribution system.



#### **COMMUNITY SERVICES**

The Community Services department is responsible for making available health and fitness opportunities in the town.

The management of the recreation facilities, parks, and trails within Westlock is provided by this department. Community Services also oversees Family Community Support Services (F.C.S.S) and the Community Bus.



#### **DEVELOPMENT SERVICES**

Development Services provides legislation information and requirements regarding land use, planning, and safety codes.

The department also oversees business licenses, Geographic Information System (GIS) and mapping, asset management, economic development, municipal cemetery, and Municipal Enforcement services.



#### CAPITAL PROJECTS

#### HERITAGE BUILDING

The Heritage Building renovations kicked off a busy construction season on January 29, 2021, with a remodel of the bathroom facilities and a rebuild of office space to accommodate Westlock & District F.C.S.S. This capital project was completed on June 15, 2021.

## 108 STREET INDUSTRIAL CORRIDOR RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT

The 108 Street Industrial Corridor Reconstruction Project began with a virtual Public Information Session on February 17. The project encompassed upgrading the roadway, underground infrastructure, and curb/sidewalks along 108 Street. Abatement issues were encountered during the project. Phase One of this project has been completed up to the bulk water station.

## STORM WATER INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECT

Our Storm Water Infrastructure Project started in February of 2021, constructing the naturalized storm water management pond. This project incorporated existing wetland areas into the design to provide natural plantings around the pond's perimeter to accommodate wildlife. This project will improve runoff quality by providing a site for suspended solids' settlement and removing contaminants from the watercourse. This project was completed in November 2021.










We also offer swim lessons, aquafit classes, special event days, and have a meeting room for special events and parties.

#### WESTLOCK REGIONAL NOTIFICATION SYSTEM

The Westlock Regional Notification System is a joint project between the Town of Westlock, Westlock County, and the Village of Clyde and launched in December of 2020. This alerting system allows users to opt in by signing up to receive text, voice mail, or email messages from a variety of categories, allowing us to provide timely emergency and municipal communications to our region.

On January 1, 2021, we added the Westlock and Area Crime Coalition (WACC) category which is aimed at reducing crime through awareness, crime prevention, and alerting residents to suspicious activities. The Westlock Detachment of the RCMP provide the alerts to the municipalities to inform residents.










#### WHERE DOES THE MONEY COME FROM?




#### WHAT WERE TAXES USED FOR IN 2021?






#### WHERE DID THE UTILITY REVENUE COME FROM?
